The only toilets on the island are in the village.





3. look for the different animals.






No fishing is allowed in the sea around Lundy Island.

In the Marine Conservation Zone the lobsters get to grow really big!




The seals have lots of food to eat and feel safe in the **Marine Conservation Zone**.

At the top of the island you will find the **Old Lighthouse**.

It isn't used anymore and is very old.


It was built in 1819, over 200 years ago.

On the top was a bright light.

The light could be seen by ships out to sea.

The **lighthouse** is 29 meters high. That's the same as 4 double-decker buses on top of each other!





When the **Old Lighthouse** closed, two new lighthouses were built on the island.




Can you see the Old Lighthouse?





There is a castle on Lundy Island, called **Marisco Castle**.



King Henry III had the castle built in 1247.



Over the years many changes have been made to the castle.

Now, people can stay in the cottages for a holiday.



Can you find the cottages inside the **castle**?



There are lots of different types of wildlife on the **island**.

Lundy has a herd of wild ponies.

Lundy ponies were born on the **island**, that is why they are called Lundy ponies.



Why are they called Lundy ponies?



There are **Highland Steers** on the **island**.

They were brought to the island to eat the grass.

There are a lot of sheep on the island. They eat the grass and live in the fields.





There are also lots and lots of rabbits.

Rabbits are **nocturnal**, which means they come out at night.

What animals have you seen during your trip?





There are over 140 different kinds of birds on Lundy.

People from all around the world come to see the birds.

Lundy is famous for its **Puffins**.

They are birds with a bright coloured beak.

A baby **Puffin** is called a Puffling.

Meaning of words in this booklet

Island	Piece of land with sea all the way around it.
Marisco Tavern	The pub on Lundy Island.
General Stores	The shop on Lundy Island.
Marine	Another word for the sea.
Conservation	Keeping an animal or piece of land safe and protected.
Lighthouse	Is a tall building with a light at the top, which helps warn ships where the land is.
Marisco Castle	The name of the castle on Lundy Island.
Highland Steers	Another name for male cattle.
Nocturnal	Animals that come out at night.
Puffin	A shy bird with a multi-coloured beak.
Nest	Where a bird lives and lays its eggs.
